School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2018-19)

Centennial High School will prepare students for post-secondary education and the work force by creating a rigorous and relevant learning environment that meets the academic, social, and emotional needs of all students.

Centennial High School Vision Statement:

Centennial High School seeks to develop and support the emotional, social, and academic needs of all our students by offering diverse program options that provide students with opportunities to develop in a safe and productive environment. In order to support the needs of its diverse student populations, Centennial engages in partnerships with local businesses and post-secondary institutions to prepare students for the 21st century workforce. Furthermore, Centennial High School staff will remain accountable in their efforts to raise student achievement and provide learning environments where continuous student improvement is part of the school culture through the use of Professional Learning Communities. Finally, staff members will participate in a multitude of ongoing professional development opportunities, provided on and off site, in order to remain up to date on current best practices with a focus on improving teaching and learning for all students.

Located in the foothills of Corona, in Riverside County, Centennial High School is a large, comprehensive high school serving an ethnically diverse student body of 3,200. Recent statistics show our current demographics of the school are 55% Hispanic, 21% White, 10% African-American and 13% of various Asian, Hawaiian, European, and Middle Eastern ethnicities. There are currently 32 different languages spoken by students on campus. Students come from families that primarily reside in single-family detached homes, although there are many who live in apartment homes surrounding the school. Currently, approximately 55.5% of the students qualify for free or reduced lunch.

Student academic levels are almost as diverse as the ethnicity of our students. Over 1600 students are enrolled in at least one honors class, including Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate/Middle Years Program courses. Over 200 students are participating in the Puente program and another 375 students are enrolled in our AVID program. Approximately 200 students are English Learners and 330 students are receiving services through Special Education that includes Basic, Essentials, Intensive Intervention, and Severely Handicapped Programs.

All students receive California State Standards-based instruction in core curricular classes, although we are transitioning to Common Core, and have the opportunity to participate in elective programs including AVID, Puente, Career Technical Education, and Visual and Performing Arts, and student leadership classes such as ASB, Peer Counseling, Renaissance, Link, and Unity.

All textbooks used in the core curriculum are aligned to the California State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 4, 2018, the Corona-Norco Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 46 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2018-19 school year, Corona-Norco Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Centennial High School's original facilities were built in 1989; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following improvements have been completed:

2017-18 Improvements in Process:

- Repainting of the entire campus
- Modernization upgrades to the library/media center (estimated completion June 2018)
- Upgrades to WiFi on campus
- Upgrades to classrooms to include flexible seating
- Upgrades to locker rooms to include more space
- New carpet and technology upgrade in counseling department

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. Seven day custodians and seven evening custodians are assigned to Centennial High School. The day custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Groundskeeping
- Restroom cleaning

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria cleanup
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Event setup/cleanup

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.
