School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2019-20)

Our Mission: At Corona Ranch we inspire all students to be responsible learners, good citizens, and to achieve high levels of learning in a safe and supportive environment.

Our Vision: To be a nationally recognized school where all students are confident, creative, and competent thinkers who are prepared for their educational future.

Corona Ranch Elementary School is located in the central region of Corona and serves students in grades transitional kindergarten through six following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year, 980 students were enrolled, including 13.7% receiving special education services, 25.5% classified as English Language Learner, and approximately 54% qualifying for free or reduced lunch. Corona Ranch serves a diverse student population, which includes 63.6% Hispanic, 18.8% White, 4.8% African American, and 9.3% Asian. In 2017-2018, third through sixth grade students took the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) test. This state test measures proficiency in grade level standards. Overall, 56% of the student met or exceeded their grade level standards in Math. This was a 6% growth from the previous year. 67% of students met or exceeded standards in English Language Arts which is a 6% increase from the previous year. Our sub-groups also showed growth as evidence of closing the achievement gap. English Learners students increased their scores by 12% in ELA and 10% in Math. Socio Economic Disadvantaged students increased their SBAC scores by 6% in ELA and 7% in Math. Hispanic students increased their scores by increased 5% in ELA and 7% in Math. Our Special Education students increased their scores by 11% in ELA and remained the same in Math.

Corona Ranch provides intervention to students is a smaller group setting through the Professional Collaboration Process by looking at standards data. Each student then goes into a grade level intervention or enrichment group to receive extra support based on their individual needs. There are additional staff members to ensure a smaller group in this learning environment.

This is the second year that we are focusing on Positive Behavior Support and Interventions (PBIS). Students are explicitly taught expected behaviors and are positively reinforced with points for exhibiting correct behaviors. Through the PBIS Rewards system, students can use their earned points in classroom and school stores to purchase privileges or items. The PBIS team meets monthly to support student learning and create better ways our students can learn the expected behaviors.

Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Instructional Materials (School Year 2019-20)

All textbooks used in the core curriculum are aligned to the California State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 3, 2019, the Corona-Norco Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 46 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2019-20 school year, Corona-Norco Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Corona Ranch Elementary School's original facilities were built in 2002; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, installation of new flooring in was completed in the multipurpose room.

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and two evening custodians are assigned to Corona Ranch Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Groundskeeping
- Restroom cleaning

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Corona Ranch Elementary School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Corona Ranch Elementary School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Tuesday, September 19, 2017. Deficiencies noted in the school inspection survey were corrected immediately by the district's maintenance department. During fiscal year 2017-18, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use at the time of the inspection.

Types of Services Funded (Fiscal Year 2018-19)

For the 2015-16 school year, Corona-Norco Unified School District spent an average of \$9,901 of total general funds to educate each student (based on 2015-16 audited financial statements and in accordance with calculations defined in Education Code §41372). The table in this report 1) compares the school's per pupil expenditures from unrestricted (basic) and restricted (supplemental) sources with other schools in the district and throughout the state, and 2) compares the average teacher salary at the school site with average teacher salaries at the district and state levels.
