School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2019-20)

Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) is a comprehensive high school located in the city of Eastvale, California, which is less than 10 minutes south on the 15 freeway from the city of Ontario. Situated on 58 acres of property, ERHS houses enough classrooms to hold 4600 students and is one of the most impressive facilities in the state of California. Mustang pride is evident when visiting our campus from the morale of the students and staff to the pristine care that is given to maintain a clean and safe campus, despite being one of the most used facilities in our county, our classrooms, office, cafeteria, gymnasium, weight room, auditorium, playing fields, and parking lots are well maintained. ERHS currently serves approximately 4,526 students and is located in a relatively new and expanding community of residential homes, strip malls, and growing retail centers.

When you walk on the ERHS campus, you will quickly notice the diversity of the student population because ERHS is the most diverse school in the Corona Norco Unified School District (CNUSD). The population of Eastvale is diverse in ethnicity, educational levels, and socioeconomic status and consists of predominantly middle-class families. CNUSD has been highlighted by the Broad Foundation and the distinguished research organization Ed Trust West for being one of the most effective school districts in the United States in reducing the achievement gap that exists between African American students, Hispanic students, and other student subgroups followed by ERHS being highlighted in a study by the Sacramento County Office of Education which stated that ERHS is doing the best job of all high schools in the state of California in reducing the achievement gap with African American Students in English language arts and the fourth best with Hispanics. Our mustang family is proud to serve the largest amount of student subgroups in the district. Our school site provides a warm, stimulating environment where students are actively involved in learning academics as well as positive values. Students receive a standards-based, challenging curriculum by dedicated professional staff based on the individual needs of the students. Ongoing evaluation of student progress and achievement helps us refine the instructional program so students can achieve academic proficiency.

Eleanor Roosevelt High School is committed to creating a dynamic, innovative learning environment that meets the needs of our diverse student body, guiding students toward excellence in college and career readiness, while challenging them to be responsible citizens. Eleanor Roosevelt High School is located in the northern region of Eastvale and serves students in grades nine through twelve following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2017-18 school year, 4537 students were enrolled, including 10% in special education, 6.1% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 43% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Instructional Materials (School Year 2019-20)

Year and month in which data were collected: September 3, 2019

All textbooks used in the core curriculum are aligned to the California State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 3, 2019, the Corona-Norco Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 46 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2019-20 school year, Corona-Norco Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Eleanor Roosevelt High School's original facilities were built in 2006; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following improvements have been completed:

- Addition of sixteen portable classrooms
- Redo football field and track
- Continued construction of Eastvale STEM Academy (completed 2018-19 year)

.Two security fences placed on the emergency access roads securing the perimeter of the school

Every morning before school begins, the custodians inspect facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. Eight-day custodians and nine evening custodians are assigned to Eleanor Roosevelt High School. The day custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Groundskeeping
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

.For the 2018-2019 school year, we initiated monthly maintenance reports to risk management.

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The assistant principal over facilities meets daily & communicates with head custodian daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Eleanor Roosevelt High School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Eleanor Roosevelt High School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Thursday, November 16, 2017. Deficiencies noted in the school inspection survey were corrected immediately by the district's maintenance department. During fiscal year 2017-18, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use at the time of the inspection.
