### School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2018-19)

Prado View Elementary School lays the foundation for all students to become career and college ready. Staff, parents, and students collaborate to create an engaging learning environment where we all thrive and have worked together to create the following vision and mission statements.

#### Vision:

T.L.C. = Building Thinkers, Learners, and Creators with Tender Loving Care.

#### Mission Statement:

Prado View Elementary School strives to provide a challenging and progressive curriculum to all students. Staff, students, and parents perceive Prado View as having a positive learning environment that nurtures academic excellence and develops creative thinking. Shared decision-making promotes ongoing changes to provide an outstanding educational program that prepares students for the future.

Prado View currently has an enrollment of 690 students on a traditional track schedule. The staff consists of 30 teachers and a support staff of 38, including instructional aides.

Students at Prado View speak over 20 languages other than English. Currently, Prado View has students are classified as English Language Learners, including several who were re-designated last year as Fluent English Proficient. A resource teacher and an instructional aide are on staff to support students meeting the criteria for resource assistance. Prado View also hosts three special day classes to support students with special education needs. Two of these classes are in support of students with autism. Additional students have been identified for Speech/Language support. The school has a school psychologist, two speech and language pathologists, an adaptive physical education teacher, occupational therapist, health clerk, and a school nurse who serve the school in varying degrees and some on less than a full-time basis. There are three, 34 station computer lab for grades K-6, two laptop carts, and a library clerk oversees the computer labs as time permits during the week.

Staff at Prado View have worked diligently to build a positive culture on campus where all students feel safe and welcomed. As part of this process, staff has received ample professional learning opportunities including Capturing Kids' Hearts and Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS), known on campus as "The Harvey Way." The Harvey Way details the expected behaviors on each area of campus and students are rewarded for meeting those expectations. In order to build social-emotional learning, students work with their classroom teachers to create a social contract that serves as an agreement for how each student will treat others and how they can be expected to treat others in return. Students who do an exemplary job of demonstrating the Harvey Way expectations serve as student ambassadors and will meet and greet other students as they arrive on campus each morning. In addition, staff has created a "Mindfulness Room" on campus for use by staff and students. This is an important tool that is utilized to teach students the important skill of self-regulation. As a result of these efforts, Prado View continues to excel in the area of SEL and support. This work is done with the support of our Parent Teacher Association (PTA), who works closely with staff to promote the goals stated in the Vision and Mission statements.

### Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Instructional Materials (School Year 2018-19)

**Year and month in which data were collected:** September 4, 2018

All textbooks used in the core curriculum are aligned to the California State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 4, 2018, the Corona-Norco Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 46 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2018-19 school year, Corona-Norco Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

**School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)**

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Prado View Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1991; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following improvements have been completed:

- Addition of a block wall in Kindergarten area
- Updated handicap areas on parking lot
- Painting of mural on 6th grade building
- Upgrade technology in classrooms
- Two laptop carts

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and two evening custodians are assigned to Prado View Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- General grounds maintenance
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

**Facilities Inspection**

The district's maintenance department inspects Prado View Elementary School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Prado View Elementary School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Wednesday, September 20, 2017. Deficiencies noted in the school inspection survey were corrected immediately by the district's maintenance department. During fiscal year 2017-18, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use at the time of the inspection.

**Types of Services Funded (Fiscal Year 2017-18)**

For the 2015-16 school year, Corona-Norco Unified School District spent an average of \$9,901 of total general funds to educate each student (based on 2015-16 audited financial statements and in accordance with calculations defined in Education Code §41372). The table in this report 1) compares the school's per pupil expenditures from unrestricted (basic) and restricted (supplemental) sources with other schools in the district and throughout the state, and 2) compares the average teacher salary at the school site with average teacher salaries at the district and state levels.
